Message From the Treasurer

I would like to wish everyone a Happy Holiday Season. We have been enjoying a mild fall and I'm praying for a mild winter. As your treasurer I wanted to send out a quick note on the 2016 budget which was approved at the November 18th meeting. As you may have already heard, there will be <u>no</u> increase in assessments in 2016.

As a result of some cost savings this year, we have been able to direct additional funds toward replenishing our reserves. The last couple of winters have seen snow fall much greater than the average. This caused snow removal expenses to be much greater than budgeted. To stay on top of all of our bills, Walnut Ridge had been taking withdrawals from its reserves. With the increased contributions to reserves starting in 2016 we should make up for those withdrawals in the next couple of years. The Walnut Ridge community is almost 30 years old and it is at the age when a community's infrastructure starts to break down. (Warning: if your roof hasn't been replaced, it's 30 years old too.) It's important to have the funds available to handle major repairs as they occur.

I wanted to add that Walnut Ridge Community Association is a financially healthy homeowners association. I work in the industry and I see an entity that is in excellent condition. Legally it is all of our money being invested to maintain our community. A well-maintained community improves all of our property values.

Hose Bib Winterizing

What is a "hose bib," you might ask, and why does it need to be winterized?



A hose bib is the faucet or spigot located on the outside of your home that you attach your garden hose to.

Why does it need winterizing? If not winterized properly, your pipes may be at risk for freezing and subsequently leak, causing costly repairs.

How should you prepare your hose bib for winter?

- Remove the hose from the hose bib. Side note: This is a good time to completely drain your garden hose and store it for the winter.
- Close inside valves supplying outdoor hose bibs. (This is normally located on the other side of the wall of the hose bib sometimes in a utility or laundry room, under the kitchen sink or in a basement.)
- Once the water is shut off to the hose bib, open the outside hose bib to allow water to drain.
- Keep the outside valve open so that any water remaining in the pipe can expand without causing the pipe to break.

Holiday Pet Safety

As pet owners, our pets rely on us to keep them safe. Here are just a few tips to keep your pet safe this holiday season.



Poinsettia, Holly, Mistletoe, Christmas cactus, and many types of lilies are poisonous to pets. Avoid having these plants in your house. Think about using artificial plants instead.

Be sure your Christmas tree is securely anchored so it does not fall or tip over. If you have a live tree, be sure your pet does not drink the tree water, as it may contain chemical treatments or even fertilizer. Be sure your ornaments and lights are placed high on your tree so they are not accessible to your pet.

Since cats love to play with ribbon and tinsel, avoid using these decorations as they can be swallowed and can cause life-threatening intestinal obstruction that might require major surgery.

Try to keep your pet on their regular diet during the holidays. Avoid giving them food from the table that might cause an upset stomach. Never give your pet turkey and/or chicken bones, as these bones can splinter and cause intestinal blockages and perforations.

Daylight Saving Time will begin at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, March 13, 2016. Remember to set your clocks *ahead* one hour. Don't forget to change the batteries in your smoke detectors too!

Front Foot Assessment Invoices

Some homeowners will be receiving (or have already received) a bill from either J & W Utilities or Rudder Management (former contact was CLT Utilities). These bills, also known as "front foot assessments" or "front foot benefit fees," represent the annual charge (for a term of 30 years, beginning at the inception of our community) to pay back the costs incurred by the developer for the installation of water and sewer lines in our community. Unless this assessment has been paid in full, either by you or the previous homeowner, **you, as the homeowner, are responsible for this yearly bill** until the expiration of 30 years from the completion of the community or until approximately the year 2020. Note, **this is not a bill for quarterly water usage**.

Lint Check! Clothes Dryer Safety


Fact - According to the National Fire Protection Association, the leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them. Fires of this nature are easily prevented by regular cleanings.



Make cleaning your dryer a regularly-scheduled maintenance program for your home. Always remove lint from your lint filter before and/or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum. Make sure that the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. If you notice that your clothes are taking longer than normal to dry, clean the lint out of the vent pipe. Most home improvement stores will sell lint cleaning kits and/or long brushes that will make it easier. There are also dryer lint removal services that will do it for you.

Always follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer. Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed. To perform a thorough cleaning of your dryer, inside and out, be sure to turn off and unplug the dryer before cleaning! So what should I write about? The beauty of the upcoming holiday or the chaos that we just survived? I'm going with both topics.



Holiday Almonds



Instructions:

Ingredients:

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1 teaspoon apple pie spice or pumpkin pie spice

) (A B C A

1/2 teaspoon curry powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon egg white

2 cups blanched almonds

In a small bowl, combine brown sugar and seasonings; set aside. In another bowl, whisk egg white until foamy. Add almonds; toss to coat. Add spice mixture; toss to coat.

Spread on a greased foil-lined baking sheet. Bake at 325° for 20-25 minutes or until lightly browned, stirring occasionally. Cool completely. Store in an airtight container. Makes 2 cups.
