DO NOT IGNORE

Front Foot Assessment Invoices From J & W UTILITIES

and

OLD LINE UTILITY LLC

Homeowners may be receiving (or have already received) a bill from either J & W Utilities or Old Line Utility, LLC. Also known as "front foot assessments" or "front foot benefit fees," these invoices are for the annual charge (for a term of 30 years, beginning at the inception of our community) to pay back the costs incurred by the developer for the installation of water and sewer lines in our community. Unless this assessment has been paid in full either by you or the previous homeowner, you, as the homeowner, are responsible for this yearly invoice until the expiration of 30 years from the completion of the community. Note, this is not a bill for quarterly water usage.

Change Furnace Filter

Be sure to replace your filter as recommended by the manufacturer so it will not become covered with dust and dirt and create a strain on your HVAC system.

Outdoor Holiday Decorations

When you begin your holiday decoration planning, please keep a few things in mind:

* If you have a live tree, be sure to water it every day so that it does not dry out and become a fire hazard. Do not posi-



tion your tree in front of a window as it will dry out faster.

- * Be considerate of your neighbors be sure that your lights do not shine into your neighbors' homes.
- * Turn off your decorations when you go to bed at night (leave your porch light on for safety).
- * Do not dump your tree or wreath on the community common ground or in the woods.
- * Natural Christmas trees and wreaths are considered yard waste and will be collected curbside. They must be free from all lights, ornaments and tree bags. Tall trees should be cut in half in order to fit into the collection truck. As a reminder, do not use plastic bags for ANY yard waste as it will not be picked up.
- * Plan to remove your decorations no later than January 31st.

Board of Directors' Meeting

Highlights of some of the items discussed at the recent Board of Directors' meeting in November:

- Budget: President Edward Rose said that future improvements to our private roads will occur in 2019 and 2020. Treasurer, Peter Giguere commented that our finances are in good order. The budget for 2019 was approved by the Board.
- Playground: The Board will be considering bids for updating the playground. Look for work to begin in the spring.
- Vandalism. A homeowner on Almond reported that there was vandalism to her vehicle in September.
- Home Inspections. Homeowners in attendance raised their concerns about the recent home inspections.
- Parking Violations. If residents notice habitual parking violations, they are encouraged to report those violations to the Board.
- Cat Branch Stream Restoration. The project is ongoing by Anne Arundel County on lower Peach Court and Walnut Ridge Drive

Snow Removal

It's snowing, and you're wondering— when will our streets be plowed? Snow accumulating 3" or more on our private roads (Almond,



Hazel Nut, Peach and Tanook) will be removed and salt applied to the roads (when necessary) by the Association's contracted snow removal company.

The County Public Works Department is responsible for removing snow on Walnut Ridge Drive, which is a County-owned road.

Snow removal on sidewalks in the front of homes is the responsibility of the homeowner and should be addressed as soon as possible.

Mistletoe!

Being kissed under the mistletoe has been a Christmas tradition for more than a thousand years. But mistletoe is not only associated with a gentle kiss, it has a lore all its own.



Viking lore describes the goddess of love, Frigga, who made each plant and animal promise not to kill her son Baldur. She forgot the mistletoe plant and Baldur was killed by a spear made from it. The white berries on the mistletoe are said to have been created from her tears.

When her son returned to life, Frigga proclaimed the mistletoe to be sacred. She kissed everyone who passed under it and decreed the plant should henceforth bring love. This is said to be the origin of kissing under the mistletoe.

So go ahead. Kiss under the mistletoe, have fun doing it, and give a nod to Frigga for starting a very enjoyable custom.

Holiday Safety for Your Pet

Poinsettia, Holly, and Mistletoe, Christmas cactus, and many types of lilies are poi-



sonous to pets. Avoid having these plants in your house. Think about artificial plants instead.

Be sure your Christmas tree is securely anchored so it does not fall or tip over. If you have a live tree, be sure your pet does not drink the tree water, as it may contain chemical treatments or even fertilizer. Be sure your ornaments and lights are placed high on your tree so they are not accessible to your pet.

Since cats love to play with ribbon and tinsel, avoid using these decorations as they can be swallowed and can cause life-threatening intestinal obstruction that might require major surgery.

Try to keep your pet on their regular diet during the holidays. Avoid giving them food from the table that might cause an upset stomach. Never give your pet turkey and/or chicken bones, as these bones can splinter and cause intestinal blockages and perforations.

Snow Stuff—Etiquette and Reminders

When it snows...

You are responsible for shoveling your stoop/ porch, walkway and sidewalk in front of your home as well as your numbered parking space.



- Shoveling snow from along curbs where parking is allowed doesn't mean you staked a claim for that area. Common courtesy is if you didn't clear the space, don't park in it.
- When shoveling your sidewalk and parking spaces, do not throw or place your shoveled snow around the mailboxes. The mail carrier must be able to get to the mailboxes, otherwise, mail will not get delivered.
- Please do not place large amounts of snow in the street, unless active plowing is taking place.
- Keep your snow to yourself. Don't toss the snow into your neighbor's parking space or walkway, even if it means you have to carry the shovel of snow a couple of extra feet.
- Do not play on, disturb, damage or remove the marker poles located at the entrances to our roads. These poles are there to assist our **snow** removal company in determining where the curbs and speed humps are located.
- Clean off your car including your lights, license plates and roof before hitting the highway. Not only is it a nuisance to other drivers when your snow blows off the car, but icy chunks hitting someone's windshield can be dangerous and cause accidents and the snow blowing from a vehicle roof can be blinding to the vehicles behind you. Also, be sure to check your windshield washer fluid and gas tank levels.
- Think of your older neighbors. If shoveling their sidewalk or parking space is too much, take care of the shoveling for them. They will be most grateful.

Board of Directors







I have to admit that I always get stressed, With so much to do and with little rest, Preparing for holidays at the end of the year, Not getting it all done is my greatest fear.






Different holiday beliefs and family traditions Christmas carols, or the latest pop tunes renditions Singing because we're happy to remember. The special holidays in the month of December.
